What an exciting year for the Muscatine County Conservation Board! A new bridge and a new park are now available for outdoor enthusiasts.

First, Saulsbury Bridge Recreation
Area now has a new bridge for safe
entrance to the park. After years of
decreasing weight limits and learning
how to adapt to the limited use a new
bridge is now open. Thank you to the
Board of Supervisors for their support
and financial help. The campgrounds,
which are a major attraction, can now
handle the larger campers coming for a
weekend of outdoor activities.



The staff is continually working on projects at Saulsbury – keeping the trails, fishing areas, hunting areas and campgrounds in top notch shape. As a Board we will be looking into some projects that were proposed, but put on hold because of limitations from the

old bridge. The new bridge has a few finishing touches to complete in the spring, but otherwise is ready for use.

Thanks to the wonderful donation of 435 acres from W.G. Block and a park planning design from Shoemaker-Haaland, Deep Lakes Park is now a reality! After committee meetings, pubic planning meetings, and many Conservation Board discussions a vision for the park was produced. The design considers how to protect the unique environment while opening the area for outdoor activities. The lakes have been named, parking areas created, rock piles moved, and cleanup continues. Thanks to Curt Weiss' grant writing skills a boat ramp was one of the first major projects. Now fisherman, canoeists, and kayakers can now access Lake Chester.





Franklin 5th graders tried out the park last May for a year-end field trip. We canoed the lake and marveled at the clear water. The kids could look down and see the fish and enjoy the wildlife. Fishing was also enjoyed. The fish were able to escape, but the kids still had fun and learned about fishing from Al Wagner, a very busy volunteer.



Deep Lakes Park has endless possibilities for conservation activities. Each year the Conservation Board will work on a major project and our

- Constructing parking lots in Deep Lakes Park.







Education Programs
In 2013, Conservation Board Staff
gave 687 programs to 11,929 people.
Of those 11,929 people, 2,008
were participants in fishing, aquatic
education, and shooting sports
programs funded by a grant from
the Iowa Department of Natural
Resources. Program participants
ranged in age from toddler through
senior citizen.

In 2013, almost three-quarters of the programs were presented to children ranging in age from 18 months through high school. More than half of the programs were given at the Environmental Learning Center and Discovery Park.






Nature hikes, fishing, canoeing, Native American games, eagle watching, survival, animals, archery, habitats, astronomy, and geocaching were just a handful of the many programs presented to participants.




In 2013, approximately 5,639 visitors (not including people who participated in our programs) came to the Environmental Learning Center to view the exhibits.

The Environmental Learning Center hosted two traveling exhibits in 2013. The Tallgrass Prairie exhibit was on display in January and February. The Snakes Alive exhibit featured a giant walk-through snake skeleton and was on display from July through September.









Muscatine Youth

Conservation Corps
In the summer of 2013 the
Conservation Board hired seven youth ages 16-18 and two crew leaders for the Muscatine Youth Conservation
Corps program.

The youth worked on outdoor conservation and recreation projects for the City of Muscatine and the County Conservation Board. Projects consisted of planting, watering, and mulching trees, staining picnic tables, stacking firewood, doing flood cleanup, and replacing tennis court fencing.

They also spent a day canoeing on the Cedar River, and banding geese with the DNR.

The program is funded entirely with donations from local industries, businesses, organizations, government entities, and individuals.



## Grants

An Outdoor Skills Grant was received from the Iowa Department of Natural Resources to hire staff to coordinate and present fishing, aquatic education, and shooting sports programs in Muscatine County.

A Water Recreation Access Grant was received from the Iowa Department of Natural Resources to construct a boat ramp on Lake Chester at Deep Lakes Park.
