## Leaving a Legacy by Katie Hammond

Curt Weiss grew up on the North side of Burlington, Iowa. He spent his childhood hunting, trapping, fishing, and exploring the woodlands and fields along Flint Creek. The countless hours spent exploring the wilder places in Iowa sparked his interest in natural resources.

On November 3, 1980 Curt Weiss showed up at Saulsbury Bridge Recreation Area at 8:00 am to begin work as a Park Attendant for Muscatine County Conservation, Curt remembers his first day of work, "We were working in the wildlife area at Saulsbury, running a chainsaw all day!" A job he has



performed countless times in the 43-years to follow.

Curt had recently graduated from Iowa State University, sporting a brand-new Bachelor's degree in Fisheries and Wildlife Biology. Although he hadn't planned on staying forever, Muscatine wasn't too far from where he grew up and it soon became home.

In 1982 the Board appointed Curt as a Peace Officer. He attended the Iowa Law Enforcement Academy

and moved into the house at Saulsbury. Just a year later, he became the Naturalist, as well as continuing the Peace Officer duties. Curt enjoyed providing environmental education and recreational opportunities to the people of Muscatine. He married his wife, Janna that same year. This year they are celebrating their 40<sup>th</sup> wedding anniversary!

In 1988, Curt shifted job duties again and became the Director for Muscatine County Conservation. A title he has held for the past 35 years. "I love my job and enjoy coming to work every day. I'm really going to miss it when I retire!"

In this position he has been able to oversee the completion of many great projects. One of the projects Curt is most proud of is the creation of Discovery Park and the Environmental Learning Center (ELC). "The best day of my career was the day we opened the Environmental Learning Center." It is a state-of-the-art Nature Center with two 1,200-gallon aquariums featuring native fish, several live animals including raptors, over 100 wildlife mounts, and a great exhibit on natural history. The project took several years to complete, but it was worth it, "We built the first trail in 1995 and the Environmental Learning Center opened in 2005!"

The ELC is located in Discovery Park, a 100-acre park located on Cedar Street in Muscatine. The park has a hard-surfaced road and walking/biking trails, two stocked ponds, two picnic shelters (and another going up next

month), a new playground, and the Muscatine Arboretum. Curt enjoys seeing people out enjoying the parks that he and the staff have worked so hard to provide. "The thing I have enjoyed the most is providing education and recreation opportunities and watching the people enjoy them!"

When Curt began his career at Muscatine County Conservation, the Board had six different parks that it managed, today there are 11! Although Saulsbury is a special place, the acquisition, development, and public use at Discovery Park and Deep Lakes Park has been incredible.

In November, Curt Weiss is retiring as the Director of Muscatine County Conservation. As the old saying goes, "If you do what you love, you'll never work a day in your life." This couldn't be truer for Curt. He has spent the past 43-years pouring time, talent, and energy into improving habitat and recreation in Muscatine County. Retiring is a little bittersweet for Curt. He knows this will provide more time to chase large game, go camping, ride his bicycle, and cast a line. There will be more time for traveling the world, which will most likely include more hunting and fishing!

Curt leaves with many lifelong friendships forged in hard work. His work will live on through the current staff as they continue to share nature with children, create habitat, and improve recreation opportunities.

Conservation isn't a career people choose for the money. Sure, it helps, but the real reason people choose to work in conservation is because they love it. Because deep down, they know they are leaving the world a little better than they found it. Curt is doing just that. He is leaving a legacy in the parks and amenities he has helped to build that will be here for future generations to enjoy!

#### Winter Wingbeats Program






